## Interview with Tessa Ogle



### What were the origins of the EIC?

It all started in 1904 when ten industry leaders met in the Holborn office of Walter Davenport of the Bottle Exchange. It might seem an unlikely place for the foundation of an organisation that was to grow into the great Electrical Industries Charity.

All ten men were pioneers of the burgeoning electrical industry. During their meeting, they discussed what might happen to "those who had spent their lives in establishing the electrical industry and had been unable to secure sufficient monetary recompense to support them if accident, infirmity, misfortune or old age limited their activities or curtailed their means".

At the time, charities were in their infancy, and state pensions, unemployment benefit and a national health service were just a dream. But these far-sighted, public-spirited men decided to do something about providing for industry colleagues who had fallen on hard times and put in £10 each as a token of their intent.

The men who made up the committee were Robert Kayne Gray; Hugo Hirst (GEC); Justus Eck, chairman (Union Electric Co.); H. Berry (NEMA); F. H. Nalder (Nalder Bros & Thompson); E. Gustav Byng (GEC); R. A. Lundberg (A. P. Lundberg & Sons); G. Sutton (Henley Telegraph Works); and two other outstanding individuals whose names were not recorded.

The men agreed to set up an electrical charity, to be called the Electrical Trades Benevolent Institution, which is now the Electrical Industries Charity. In 1905, the institution was founded, and the first donation of £650 was recorded in April the same year.

### Who is the charity designed to help?

The EIC is an industry charity that helps anyone who is working or has worked in the electrical and energy-related sectors.

The charity brings industries together to help their own by providing financial relief and practical support services to people and their immediate families who have worked or are working in the electrical and energy-related sectors, representing 1.3 million people.

In the 2017/2018 financial year, we supported:

**1047** We have given financial assistance grants in varying forms to 1047 people

**7460** Even more importantly, we have given support, direction and guidance to 7460 people.

**55%** That's a massive increase over the previous year.

## Record Number of People Helped



### In what ways can people donate to the charity?

There are many ways for people to get involved. They can fundraise individually through various fundraising events, such as running the London Marathon for us or doing an individual or team challenge.

Other ways to contribute include:

- Participating in a challenge for a local event or picking any event and starting a fundraising page for us.
- Attending our regional fundraising events, which provide a steady income to our charity of around 25% of our revenue.
- Making corporate donations to support us.
- Playing powerLottery, which is our most important income stream. Just like the National Lottery, which helps to fund the British Olympic team, powerLottery helps to fund financial grants within the industry and our practical support services. It is fundamental to what we do, and we encourage everyone in the industry to sign up for only £1 per month to help to support the industry. powerLottery is only run to support the industry and is our only annuity-style fundraising mechanism. We have to increase our lottery base by 20,000 subscribers to ensure that we can keep up with demand.

### Why is it important that the industry gets involved?

When people fall on the worst of times, we are there as the backup for the industry. It is incredibly important to remember the fundamentals of why the charity was originally set up, which was to support people within the industry who suffer significant hardship. I truly hope that you never have to ask us, but, if you do, it's nice to know that there are funds available should you need financial assistance and support services that may not be available anywhere else.

### What was your background before joining the EIC?

I worked for engineering firm Parsons Brinckerhoff (a Balfour Beatty company) for 11 years, heading up the oil and gas division from the southern part of the world. I've worked across the renewables, nuclear, mining and heavy chemical industries.

### What drew you to the charity?

I was working on an aid project in Cambodia building houses for families affected by HIV/AIDS, and I thought it was such a shame that everyone waits until the end of their careers to give back, as I saw a big gap in the sector for talented and commercially driven people. So, I made a decision to take five years out at the peak of my career to give back to an industry that has given me so much. It was the best decision I've made. My aim is to leave the industry in a better place than when I started. I'm hoping to shine a light on some of the big issues affecting our industry, such as high suicide and divorce rates. Then I'll likely return to the commercial sector.

### What new initiatives does the EIC have planned for the future?

We have teamed up with Mates in Mind to roll out mental health awareness training to the industry. The two-hour training course will be run from our office at Rotherwick House on the last Tuesday of the month from 4pm to 6pm.

We offer free counselling services to anyone in the industry and their immediate family members. We are hoping to reach people earlier, before they reach crisis points. This year has been tragic in terms of the sheer volume of attempted suicides in the industry, reaching over 400. With one in three of our applicants citing mental health issues, we know that early intervention is key.

I've created an emerging professionals board (people with less than ten years' experience) to spread the mental health awareness campaign to ensure that we get a fresh perspective from the industry. They will also rotate through our trustee board, encouraging diversity at all levels of our industry.

### What initiative, current or future, are you most excited about?

Our major fundraising for a cause case will see us working with the industry to build a fit-for-purpose house for the Caz Dickinson appeal. It is kind of like a DIY SOS project. We have raised just over £170,000 - our target is £250,000. Next week, we are interviewing architects to appoint for the build.

## Do your staff know what support is available to them?

The EIC has several workplace programmes that are extremely beneficial to employers and employees, which function as industry-specific employee assistance programmes (or EAPs). Member benefits are available free to anyone in the industry and their immediate family members, offering a broad range of benefits designed to help in times of need.

- Legal support with divorce, custody battles and will/estate issues.
- Counselling: telephone or in person (private psychiatric assessments, one-to-one therapy, CBT and DBT).
- Financial assistance and grants (grant sizes range from £100 to £250,000). Support for operations not covered under the NHS, SSP financial support for major illness and emergency financial grants.
- Carer support: respite breaks, mobility equipment and medical support to help people to remain independent.
- Complex case management support: assigned case workers to help people to get back on their feet, from grant writing on their behalf to sorting out benefits, insurance forms or medical forms. Practical bereavement support for families when they lose a loved one.
- Support for autism and dyslexia, managers' training and educational support for pre- and post-diagnosis.
- Debt advice: how to manage debt and get ahead with professional advice and assistance.
- Electrical engineering scholarships: a helping hand for future engineers through scholarship funds.
- Apprentice scholarships: help meeting the real costs of gaining qualifications.
- Apprentice bursary scheme: additional financial support for apprentices with carer responsibilities.
- Career development and transition assistance: help making the leaps between jobs or stages of life.



# Case Study

## Anant Savani

**The following case study touches on common issues we see across the industry. Typically, when people are reaching out for assistance, they are at a crisis point. Anant's story is incredibly important to tell. It touches on work pressures following a redundancy, family pressures and not wanting to burden his wife with how overwhelmed he felt. Men in our industry often won't discuss emotional distress with their significant others. With suicide rates 2.7 times higher than the national average, we have a lot to do in our industry in regard to mental health.**



Anant Savani started his career in the electrical industry over 15 years ago, when he joined one of the leading electrical companies in the UK. Anant went on to work in a variety of roles, including technical, contracting and sales.

At the start of his career, he specialised in sales and worked for a number of large electrical and construction companies until he was presented with an opportunity to become a joint director of an electrical company. However, the company was later sold, and he decided to move on. He joined a construction company, which was going well until he returned from his holidays and was told he was no longer required the very next day. He was left facing unemployment and uncertainty. This period of unemployment left Anant suffering from anxiety and depression as a result of his belief that he would no longer be able to provide for his family and support his two sons - a belief made worse by the fact that his 12-year-old son Manish is on the autism spectrum.

First diagnosed at the age of one, Manish has faced some very difficult challenges over the years, including a difficulty with social interaction as a result of his lack of understanding and awareness of other people's emotions and feelings. He also has impaired language and communication skills and has suffered from delayed language development and an inability to start conversations or take part in them in a way that other children of his age would.

Over the years, Manish has received a wide range of support in areas including speech and language, numeracy, and social skills. He is also now attending a special needs school and is able to do everything himself. Despite the excellent progress he has made, Manish still requires a lot of moral support, and although he has learned to live with his condition, he will always require support - particularly from his parents.

Autism affects both the person who is on the autism spectrum and those who are caring for their autistic loved one. Very often, a person on the

autism spectrum faces stigma and misunderstanding, which can put significant pressure on and cause isolation for both the person and their family. This is an area that is often overlooked, as many families fight to get support for a child with autism, but you can never underestimate the effect that it can have on the rest of the family.

The basic need to support family is the one thing that keeps most people going in their day-to-day lives; when the ability to do this is taken away, it can often lead to long-term depression - particularly if a member of the family has been diagnosed with autism. This was the case for Anant, and although he secured a financially stable job at an electrical company, his problems were far from over. Over several months, Anant struggled to motivate himself and his depression worsened, which put a lot of pressure on his relationship, family life and job.

He struggled to open up to his family, as he did not want to worry them, and, like many men working in what is seen as a 'macho' industry, he was too embarrassed to share his problems with his colleagues, who always saw him as a happy and upbeat person. As a result, Anant continued to suffer in silence, which meant that his depression took its toll. He started to have suicidal thoughts on a daily basis and eventually came to a point where he almost took his own life. It was at this point that he knew he needed to seek help. A previous employer that Anant had worked for at the start of his career put him in touch with the Electrical Industries Charity, and he is now receiving counselling and continuous support - both of which are helping him to look forward to a brighter future.

But Anant also wanted some good to come from the mental health issues he has faced: by sharing his story, he wants to highlight the importance of ending the stigma of mental health. Mental illness knows no boundaries and can affect anyone at any time. Only by talking about it and sharing problems can we begin to spread awareness in everyday life and ensure that people like Anant are able to seek help before it spirals out of control.

# Power Lottery
