

WELCOME MESSAGE




Dear Reader,

CO-OCCURRING DISORDERS WITH ADDICTION AND MENTAL HEALTH





In 2021 there was a 217% rise in addiction within our industry from the year prior, with powdered cocaine being the drug of choice.

When you have both a substance abuse problem and a mental health issue such as depression, bipolar disorder, or anxiety, it is called a co-occurring disorder or dual diagnosis. Dealing with substance abuse, alcoholism, or drug addiction is never easy, and it's even more difficult when you're also struggling with mental health problems.

In co-occurring disorders, both the mental health issue and the drug or alcohol addiction have their own unique symptoms that may get in the way of your ability to function at work, maintain a stable home life, handle life's difficulties, and relate to others.

> To make the situation more complicated, the co-occurring disorders also affect each other.

When a mental health problem goes untreated, the substance abuse problem usually gets worse. And when alcohol or drug abuse increases, mental health problems usually increase too.

Unfortunately, the industry isn't disclosing this to the Charity when individuals seek support with their mental health, leading to longer treatment times and sometimes ineffective treatment plans.







Understanding how addiction impacts our mental health and how we can stop the infinite link between the two, in 2022 the Electrical Industries Charity want to highlight co-occurring disorders with addiction and mental health. With the levels of addiction increasing so much in 2021 it is inevitable that support from the Electrical Industries Charity will be needed to assist those living with addiction and a co-occurring disorder.

By highlighting the link between addiction and mental health the Electrical Industries Charity want to ensure that sector colleagues are getting the support they need and that more importantly as an industry we are highlighting the dangerous relationship between addiction and our mental wellbeing.



NEW HEALTH CALENDAR FOR 2022

Our annual health calendar focuses on some of the key topics that people in our industry have been dealing with in their everyday lives. Each month we will cover a different area of health and support, providing information and case studies and looking at some key facts and advice.

It's important to take care of yourself and get the most from life. We are working towards and supporting our industry to become more pro-active in understanding what mental health is and how we can all maintain or improve our wellbeing. We all find time to ensure our physical health is reasonable, but we rarely find time to look after our mental health, which is just as important. Our health calendar is a great tool to provide you with information, stats, and guidance on the services we can provide to you, a family member, colleague or employee.

Health issues can put significant pressure on an individual and their family, therefore, having a larger support network is crucial to help them to overcome these struggles and have a brighter future ahead. 

THE RETURN OF THE EDA AWARDS DINNER MEANS A BOOST FOR INDUSTRY COLLEAGUES IN NEED

It has been a long time coming, but the EDA Awards Dinner finally returned to the Intercontinental London for an unforgettable evening. The night celebrated leaders from the electrotechnical sector who have championed the professional development and training of their teams and businesses through the EDA Apprenticeship Service and the EDA Product Knowledge Training Modules. Every awards dinner raises a huge amount of money to support those who need assistance in our sector, and this year was no different.

Together attendees at the EDA Awards Dinner raised over £8,570 for the Electrical Industries Charity and those we support. This is a record-breaking amount from the EDA dinner attendees and we cannot say thank you enough for their support and the ongoing support of the EDA.









CHANGES FOR SUSTAINABILITY AT CEFCO MEAN EIC CAN REMAIN SUSTAINABLE TOO

We all understand the importance of making changes to our everyday habits to make a positive impact on our environment. While we all try to recycle our cartons and turn off the tap while we brush our teeth, we need to do more to make a real difference. Larger companies have also been trying to do their bit to help turn the tide on climate change.

Some businesses have made the promise to go carbon neutral, and others are making the swap to all electric vehicles, but an organisation which has made a big difference in our sector is CEFCO, an in-house company of massive Charity supporters CEF. CEF SUPPLIER EVENT 'SHAPING THE FUTURE TOGETHER' 2021 RAISES OVER £100,000 FOR THE CHARITY

CEF invited the Electrical Industries Charity to be their charity partner at their inaugural supplier event, held at The Fairmont Windsor Park on Thursday 4th November 2021.

As part of the program, CEF presented to their supplier partners about the importance of the industry supporting the Charity and how our vital work impacts the entire supply chain.

An incredible £6,892 was raised on the evening and suppliers were encouraged to match the donations. 



I think it's part of human nature to want to help others and be that listening ear for someone, you get that a lot being a hairdresser – you stand and listen all day with scissors in your hand. In 2019 I founded my own organisation in memory of my brother Ben who I lost to suicide. The Ben Raemers Foundation. It is a men's mental health foundation that is mainly aimed at the skateboarding community. Ben was a professional skateboarder. I knew there was nothing that had been done like this before in the skateboarding world. This was where my real relationship with the importance of mental health began.

As a welfare case officer, what is the biggest focus of your job?

The biggest focus is approaching each case with the same amount of empathy, care, support and with a non-judgmental attitude.

Thinking outside the box and exploring different avenues to resolve any pain points our cases may be facing.



Tell us about a case you have been working on:

We had a call from a dad through helpline who had concerns for his son's wellbeing after he disclosed that he had been struggling with bullying at school and had just lost an aunt whom he was very close to. He heartbreakingly relayed a turn of events that happened a few nights before where his son tried to take his own life at the age of just 11. I managed to source a child psychologist who was able to see the son face to face almost immediately, and once the sessions began there was an instant change in the son's all-round wellbeing. The dad also told me how his son loved outdoor sports, so I sent over a spare skateboard I had for him. Once it arrived, I got a photo of him with it, which was so lovely. It's so rewarding to have a real-world impact, especially on someone so young and his entire family.

What is the most challenging part of your role?

I would say when you have a call through the helpline and either substance misuse or alcohol is present with the person you're trying to support. It can be really challenging to help someone who is under the use of drugs and alcohol.

What is your favourite aspect of your role?

My favourite aspect is being able to support someone who has been struggling and feeling like they are in the darkest place. Being able to scoop them up and work with them to get them back into a good headspace is somewhat beautiful. After losing my brother to suicide I have really felt my role has helped in my healing process. Using tools I have learnt through my lived life experience to save others makes each day amazing.

THE IMPACT OF A FAMILY MEMBER SUFFERING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS

In May 2021 we launched our Electrical Industries Charity podcast channel. We have a whole host of exciting content lined up for you to tune into and in this podcast we engage with the often missed and forgotten family member's experience of supporting someone with mental illness.

Steph is the daughter of John, who has experienced great financial distress which massively impacted his physical and mental health. We have asked Steph to join us in sharing some of the challenges, learnings and changes that she experienced while trying to support her dad through his illness.

PAYROLL LOTTERY PROCESS

COMPANY PERSPECTIVE

STEP 1 — REGISTERING COMPANY



Register your company's interest to sign up to the Payroll Lottery with EIC by contacting **lottery@electricalcharity.org**

STEP 2 — CONTRACT ISSUED

EIC will issue each participating company a Payroll Lottery Contract. The company will provide the EIC with its full legal name for the contract and the nominated Payroll Contact. The EIC will add this information into contract to be authorised and returned to us.

STEP 6 — TO CONFIRM ALL EMPLOYEES ARE STILL EMPLOYED

Company Payroll contact confirms if all employees on the report are employed by the company and send the EIC lottery administrator an email to confirm the deduction report. If there are players on the report who have left their employment or appear on the report in error these should be deleted, and the amended report sent back to the EIC lottery administrator.

STEP 3 — COMPANY ADDED TO PORTAL

EIC will add the Company to the lottery portal drop down list.

STEP 5 — DEDUCTION REPORTS SENT TO PAYROLL CONTACT

The EIC will produce a monthly report on all players who joined the company lottery through the online portal. A secure folder will be set up where the payroll company contact can access these reports. The Payroll contact will receive an email on the 16th of each month telling them to access the lottery deductions report in the folder for the month.

STEP 4 — COMPANY GENERATED MARKETING MATERIAL

The EIC will design an email campaign for each participating company on the sign-up process and why the lottery is important for the Industry.

This email campaign can then be distributed to staff internally.

STEP 7 — COMPANY PAYROLL CONTACT MAKES THE DEDUCTIONS FROM PAYROLL

Payroll contact makes the deductions from each players salary. Company then makes a BACS transfer to the Electrical Industries Charity by the last day of the month. The payment to the EIC should match exactly the amount from the lottery report confirmed with the EIC lottery administrator.

STEP 8 — CONFIRMING DRAW RUN

Company Payroll contact will receive an email from the EIC administrator confirming that the money has been received and the staff have been entered into the draw.





